Vinesh Phogat one match away from medal

one match away from securing a guaranteed medal at the Paris 2024 Olympics. Phogat's journey to the semi-finals in the women's 50kg freestyle category has been nothing short of thrilling, marked by a series of hard-fought victories. In a closely contest-

ed quarterfinal, Phogat emerged victorious against Ukraine's Oksana Livach with a score of 7-5. Phogat, competing in her third Olympic Games, took an early 2-0 lead in the first period. Despite a strong comeback attempt by Livach in the second period, Phogat held her ground and secured the win, moving her one step closer to an Olympic podium.

The quarterfinal victory followed an earlier sensational match where Phogat orchestrated a dramatic comeback to defeat Tokyo 2020 gold med-

Embezzlement case

Police custody of Kale extended

NASHIK: The local court here has extended the custody of Arun Kale, the former secretary of the Nashik Agriculture Produce Market (APMC), Committee who is implicated in a Rs. 90 lakh embezzle-

ment case. When produced in court, Kale was initially remanded to police custody until Monday, August 5. His custody has now been extended for an additional three days, until Wednesday, August 7.

APMC clerk Sunil Jadhav is accused of misusing 12 receipt books, tampering with official documents, and cheated the APMC of Rs. 89,77,200. Nashik APMC secretary Prakash Gholap then lodged a police complaint against Sunil Jadhav. Jadhav's initial bail application was rejected by the Nashik court. Thereafter he made appeal to the High Court.

The High Court during its observatrions raised questions about the two-year delay in filing the case and noted that Jadhav's service termination followed a departmental inquiry, with the delay attributed to administrative issues.

During the investigation, Kale has been uncooperative, failing to assist the police and appear in court, or submit requested documents. Consequently, he was taken into custody by police on court orders for repeatedly disregarding judicial directives.

Police bust 14 gold chain theft cases FDA seizes unlicensed



NASHIK: The Indiranagar police have uncovered a series of gold chain snatchings across 14 locations within the limits of Ambad and Indiranagar police stations. Goods worth Rs. 17,58,524 have been confiscated from three suspects, including a juvenile. Police are registering a case against a jeweller who purchased the stolen gold, as informed by Deputy Commissioner of Police (Circle II) Monica Raut in a press conference on Tuesday.

Assistant police inspector Ankolikar, along with amaldar Sagar Koli and Jaylal Rathod of the Indiranagar police station, successfully laid a trap and apprehended the gold chain thieves. Upon investigation, the crime

investigation team at Indiranagar police station, interrogating suspects Parvez Javed Maniyar and a juvenile, revealed their involvement in seven cases of gold chain theft.

The police seized 81.290 grams of gold and a Pulsar motorcycle, amounting to Rs. 6,98,524, from the suspects. Additionally, a scythe used in the thefts was confiscated.

Similarly, when the Ambad police detained another juvenile and interrogated him, he confessed to stealing seven gold chains along with his accomplices Manoj Sanjay Otari, Akshay Sunil Borkar, and other juveniles, all residents of Shivajinagar, Satpur. The police recovered 14.3

tolas of gold and a motorcycle used in the crimes, worth Rs. 10.60 lakh.

In total, 14 crimes within Circle II have been uncovered, with goods worth Rs. 17,58,524 seized. Assistant inspector Ankolikar of the crime investigation team, assistant inspector Kiran Raundal, PSI Bhushan Sonar, and their colleagues under the guidance of Commissioner of Police Sandeep Karnik, Deputy Commissioner of Police (Circle II) Monika Raut, Assistant Commissioner of Police Shekhar Deshmukh, senior inspector of Ambad police station Sunil Pawar, and senior police inspector of Indiranagar Police Station Ashok Sharmale did this job.

tea powder

NASHIK: Officials from the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) carried out a raid at the

Nashik Tea Company, located at Bazaar Ground on Nashik-Kalwan Road in Dindori tehsil. During the raid, they seized tea powder worth Rs. 2.01 lakh due

to violations of

The investigation revealed that the company lacked a valid license for the storage and sale of tea powder under the Food Safety Standards Act. Additionally, the seized tea powder was found to be improperly labelled, as the bags did not display the required text. As a result, 560 kg of tea powder was confiscated, and the company has been instructed to cease operations as it has no necessary

The collected samples have been sent to a laboratory for analysis, and further action will be taken after receiving the test reports. The raid was carried out by food safety officer Yogesh Deshmukh

and sample assistant Pagare, under the supervision Ūdayadatt Lohkare, Joint Commissioner of the Nashik division. Meanwhile, the FDA
