Grand alliance govt in state aimed at people's welfare: Yadav

NASHIK: While addressing at a tribal workers' convention, organized by the Maharashtra Pradesh BJP on Sunday here, Union Minister of Environment, Forest and Climate Change Bhpender Yadav underscored the significance of the Mahayuti alliance, asserting its purpose is to benefit the people of Maharashtra. Yadav, who is also the BJP's state in-charge, emphasized that the party is dedicated to maintaining alliance dharma and fostering respect among coalition partners within the grand alliance.

"Everyone must work together to establish a competent government in Maharashtra that can effectively support the central government in the upcoming State Assembly elections," Yadav stated, encouraging party workers to show the liars the way home in order to form a strong state government.



BJP's national co-executive Shivprakash, Tribal Development Minister Dr. Vijay Kumar Gavit, Uttam Ingale, MP Dr. Sumersinh Solankhi, former Union Minister of State Dr. Bharati Pawar, former MP Heena Gavit former Mayor Ranjana Bhansi and others were present.

In his address, Yadav praised tribal communities for their role in preserving Indian culture and highlighted the BJP government's ongoing commitment to their

upliftment. He emphasized that the government's welfare schemes for tribal communities have been effectively reaching households, achieving a near-complete distribution. "From the youth to the elders, the government is striving for the effective implementation of various schemes," he noted.

Yadav highlighted the empowerment of tribal women, stating that the BJP has enabled them to achieve self-reliance and financial stability.

He pointed out that the current President of India hails from a tribal background and mentioned Odisha's distinction of having the first tribal chief minister in the nation.

He also discussed the significant schemes being implemented for tribal welfare in states like Gujarat, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, and Rajasthan, contrasting this with what he described as the lack of progress by the Congress party over the past 50 years.

"The Modi government has successfully completed the Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana that was initiated during the Vajpayee government," he added.

Yadav further commended the Maharashtra government's Ladki Bahin Yojana, highlighting its effectiveness in promoting respect for women. He announced plans to provide free healthcare facilities for senior citizens aged 70 and above.

At the end, Yadav urged everyone to work hard to secure a majority for the Mahayuti alliance, stating that this is essential to continue advancing public interest initiatives in the future. BJP executive Shiv Prakash and Tribal Development Minister Vijay Kumar Gavit also spoke on the occasion. Former Union Minister of State Dr. Bharati Pawar proposed a vote of thanks, while N D Gavit compered the programme.

RTO employees to go on strike from Sept 24

NASHIK: The State Motor Vehicle Department (RTO) Employees' Union has announced an indefinite strike starting Tuesday, September 24, following unsuccessful discussions with Transport Commissioner Vivek Bhimanwar regarding implementation of various demands by the state government.

The Union, which has represented thousands of employees for the past 66 years, voiced concerns over various administrative issues that have emerged in recent years. Despite submitting charters of demands to the government, the Union has faced ongoing challenges, including arbitrary changes in departmental examinations and the controversial policy of revenue departmental transfers. These issues have left many employees feeling marginalized, the Union has stated.

The union's frustration has intensified due to the

lack of effective implementation of the Kalaskar Committee's recommendations aimed at improving work conditions and addressing seniority and transfer issues. As a result, RTO employees across Maharashtra are prepared to take action, citing that their grievances have been ignored, the Union has further stated.

Prior to the strike, the Union gave notice to the Transport Commissioner and Additional Chief Secretary (Transport) about their decision. On September 19, Transport Commissioner Bhimanwar convened a meeting to discuss the Union's pending demands. However, discussions were failed.

The Union representatives have stated that they will not reconsider the strike unless a formal, written response is provided addressing each of their demands. All Union office bearers participated in the discussions.

NASHIK: Five days have passed since the tragic double suicide of the Sahane family in the Pathardi Phata area, but the exact reasons behind this heart-breaking incident, as well as the mysterious death of their daughter, remain unclear. Adding to the distress is the unresolved suicide case of Asmita Patil, a girl student at an engineering college in Panchavati. Police are still in the dark about the reasons behind both cases.

The police have been hampered in their investigation due to the grief-stricken state of the families involved, who are yet to fully cooperate. Despite this, police continue their efforts to uncover the truth. So far, no formal

complaint has been registered by the Sahane family regarding the tragedy.

The victims in the Sahane family case have been identified as Vijay Manik Sahane (41), his wife Dnyaneshwari (32), and their 10-year-old daughter, Ananya. Vijay and Dnyaneshwari were found to have taken their own lives in the early hours of Wednesday, September 18. Shockingly, Ananya had been killed earlier, with evidence suggesting she was poisoned or given a harmful substance, and her mouth was sealed with adhesive tape—a discovery that has left many unanswered questions.

The situation took another turn when Vijay's elder brother alleged that

Vijay's decision to end his life, along with his wife's, was driven by stress related to his job at a well-known company. While the company has yet to issue a statement, the police have summoned its management for questioning today (Sept. 23).

Police have thoroughly searched the Sahane family's residence for clues, including medical documents, loan papers, bank statements, and any indication of financial distress. However, no significant evidence has been found thus far. Havaladar Garle is investigating into Ananya's suspicious death and the double suicide, and the police plan to file a case once more details surrounding Ananya's murder emerge.

Pending viscera report

The investigation has revealed that Vijay and Dnyaneshwari's suicides were premeditated, and it is suspected that they killed Ananya shortly before ending their own lives. However, the exact cause of Ananya's death remains unknown until the viscera report is received from the forensic department. The police are actively pursuing this report, which is expected to provide key insights into how Ananya was killed. The family has indicated they will cooperate with the investigation after performing a 10-day ritual for the deceased.

Statements of Asmita's friends recorded

Meanwhile, police are still investigating the circumstances surrounding the death of Asmita Sandeep Patil, who committed suicide at her college hostel. The Adgaon police have recorded statements 20 friends of her and conducted a preliminary inquiry of her family. Described as a brilliant and outspoken student, Asmita did not appear to have any conflicts at home or with her peers. Her family claims that her suicide was related to a discrepancy in her attendance records, despite her presence in the hostel. The investigation is ongoing, with police searching for her suicide note, attendance records, and other evidence, and they believe the case will be resolved in the coming days.

Mystery deepens

Ganja seized

NASHIK: The anti-narcotics team of city police crime branch has successfully apprehended two individuals for their involvement in the sale and possession of narcotics. The suspects, identified as Sandeep alias Bala Rajaram Mahale and Sukdev Gangadhar Jadhav, were caught with two kilos of ganja worth approximately Rs. 1.5 lakh, along with an auto rickshaw.

Sandeep Mahale, a 24-year-old resident of Ambad village, has a previous narcotics-related case registered against him in 2021 with the Ambad police.

The anti-narcotics team acted on a tip-off, setting up a trap in the Ambad area. They observed Mahale and Jadhav, aged 33 and residing on Ambad Link Road, transporting the ganja in their auto rickshaw. Following their detention, the team seized a total of 2.533 kilos of ganja.
