

Traffic woes in Nashik city

Need to curb unruly drivers

NASHIK: Traffic congestion and violations of traffic signals have become a significant issue in Nashik city, especially along key intersections between Pimpalgaon Bahula Municipal Corporation limits and the ITI signal. This area, which includes the busy Satpur

industrial area, sees
a large number of
vehicles belonging
to workers, farmers, labourers, and
the commercial
sector, all rushing
to meet strict work
schedules. Unfortunately, many drivers
ignore traffic rules, leading
to frequent signal violations and accidents.

The intersection at Mahindra Circle

The intersection at Mahindra Circle and Ashok Nagar is notorious for such violations, where many drivers treat traffic signals as optional. Despite the heavy traffic, some drivers act as though the signals are not meant for them, creating a chaotic situation. The ITI signal, which serves as a main entry point to the industrial area, is another hotspot where drivers often flout the rules. While many two-wheeler and four-wheeler drivers stop at the

signal, some continue to ignore it, contributing to traffic bottlenecks. A lack of traffic police presence at these crucial points exacerbates the situation.

Trimbak Road, which runs through the industrial area, is always crowded with a mix of vehicles, including goods vehicles, two-wheelers, four-wheelers,

city buses, and vehicles heading to the Trimbakeshwar temple. The traffic volume increases significantly during peak hours, yet many drivers act recklessly, causing accidents

and creating traffic jams. The absence of regular police personnel leaves drivers to continue their unlawful behaviour unchecked.

One of the major concerns is the growing number of vehicles coming from the New Nashik area to the Satpur industrial area. As traffic signals turn green for one direction, many drivers from New Nashik often disregard the rules and jump the signal, creating further confusion and danger. Without traffic personnel present, the number of undisciplined drivers has steadily increased, making it difficult for

others to navigate the roads safely.

In the Trimurti Chowk area, after a major accident, a signal was installed to manage traffic. However, the lack of enforcement has led to a situation where drivers, except for a few, continue to disregard the signal, making the area a hotspot for violations.

Address reckless driving among youth

A significant portion of the traffic violations is caused by young drivers, who tend to ignore signals. Many young drivers express frustration at having to wait at a signal for a minute, viewing it as an inconvenience. This attitude contributes to the growing disregard for traffic rules. The police administration has proposed the installation of CCTV cameras at key signals to monitor and fine violators. However, the success of this plan depends on its proper implementation, which could be crucial in curbing the behaviour of unruly drivers. Without stricter enforcement and constant monitoring, traffic in Nashik city will continue to be a challenge for both law-abiding citizens and commuters.

Vocational education for ashramshala students



NASHIK: Vocational education will be effectively introduced in government-run ashramshalas under the Tribal Development Department. An Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) has been signed with Lend a Hand India to provide pre-vocational education to students from Classes VI to VIII.

There are 497 government-run ashramshalas under the Tribal Development Department, educating nearly two lakh students. Vocational education has been available for Classes IX to HSC since 2014-15 in 179 ashramshalas across

Maharashtra. With this MoU, 26,672 students from Classes VI to VIII will now also benefit from pre-vocational training.

This includes 11,825 students from Nashik Additional Commissionerate, 7,982 from Thane Additional Commissionerate, 3,016 from Nagpur Additional Commissionerate and 3,849 from Amravati Additional Commissionerate.

In the first phase, 213 ashramshalas have been selected for implementation, with more ashramshalas to be added in subsequent phases.

Meanwhile, the MoU

signing event was attended by Commissioner Nayana Gunde, Additional Commissioner Sandeep Golait, Joint Commissioner Santosh Thube, and other officials.

Yoga, exercise key for respiratory health: Dr. Sakhala



NASHIK: Respiratory and lung diseases are on the rise, affecting not only the elderly but increasingly the youth as well. To combat these issues, yoga and regular exercise play a crucial role, said Dr. Swapnil Sakhala, a respiratory specialist at Narayani Hospital.

Dr. Sakhala stated this while providing his guidance as the chief guest at the monthly meeting of the Dirghayushi Senior Citizens Association. Association founder president Appa Baviskar,

president Shrikant Surte, Arvind Attarde, and Ramesh Jagtap were present on the dais.

Dr. Sakhala highlighted the common symptoms of respiratory disorders, which include shortness of breath, wheezing, chest tightness, severe coughing, excessive sputum, chest pain during breathing, loss of appetite, and weight loss. He stated that anyone experiencing these symptoms should immediately consult a respiratory specialist for treatment.

NASHIK: The Ultra Hill Marathon took place in the Anjaneri mountain ranges, organized by Grape County Resort. This year marked the fourth edition of the Marathon, with over 1,500 competitors from across the state joining the race.

The Marathon featured five race categories: 5, 10, 15, 30, and 50 kilometres, with each group requiring participants to climb and

descend two or more mountain ranges. The 10-kilometre group saw the highest number of participants.Runners of all ages, including those above 50, took part, with competitors from cities such as Mumbai, Nashik, Chhatrapati Sambhajinagar, Pune, Thane, and Nagpur. The race was held in clean, pollution-free, and trafficfree areas, creating an ideal environment for the participants.



Wada gutted

NASHIK: A fire broke out early Tuesday morning in a 125-year-old dilapidated wada in New Tambat lane, located on the road from Ashok Stambh to Ravivar Peth. Fortunately, there were no casualties, but the fire caused significant financial damage.

The wada, owned by the Tambat brothers, had been abandoned for the last 8 to 10 years and was no longer inhabited. Located opposite Kansara Mangal Karayalaya, the structure was made entirely of teak wood and was in poor condition, lacking electricity connection.

Firefighters responded quickly, deploying three fire tenders to the scene. Despite their efforts, the fire severely damaged the single-storey building. The exact cause of the fire remains unclear, with both the Tambat family and the firefighters puzzled over how it started.
