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Potholes

Municipal Commissioner orders action

NASHIK: Municipal Commissioner Manisha Khatri has issued strict directives to address the growing concerns of citizens regarding the prevalence of potholes across the city. Taking serious note of frequent complaints, Khatri has mandated immediate and systematic action to ensure safer and smoother roads in all six municipal divisions.

Khatri instructed engineers from the Public Works Department (PWD) to personally inspect potholes in their respective divisions daily. They are required to initiate repairs immediately and submit a report detailing the number of potholes filled each day to the city en-

To ensure consistent progress, the Additional Municipal Commissioner (City) has been tasked with conducting biweekly review meetings with the construction department. These meetings will evaluate the status of potholes across all major and minor roads in Nashik city and prepare a comprehensive report for submission to the Municipal Commissioner

The six municipal divisions—

There are numerous potholes on roads across the municipal area, I and my office have been receiving complaints in writing about these issues. These potholes have caused accidents and are tarnishing the reputation of the Municipal Corporation. This matter is serious, and immediate action is necessary. The concerned department has been instructed to act swiftly.

Cidco, Satpur, Nashik Road, Panchavati, Nashik East, and Nashik West—have been plagued with potholes, leading to citizens' frustration and frequent minor accidents. Although the construction department had earlier encouraged citizens to report potholes via WhatsApp and claimed to have resolved those complaints, the persistence of the issue has drawn sharp criti-

Expressing her displeasure over the ongoing complaints, Khatri emphasized the need for immedi-

ate, concrete measures. She ordered junior engineers, deputy engineers, and divisional officers to inspect their areas daily and promptly address both small and large potholes. Divisional officers have been instructed to monitor the work closely and ensure daily updates are submitted to the respective executive

The executive engineers are required to personally inspect road conditions and verify pothole repairs in their divisions. A consolidated report must be submitted to the city engineer, who will oversee activities across all divisions and report regularly to the Additional Municipal Commissioner.

To streamline communication, Khatri has directed the creation of a dedicated WhatsApp group involving key stakeholders, including the junior and deputy engineers, city engineer, Additional Municipal Commissioner, Municipal Commissioner, divisional officers, and the public relations officer. This group will facilitate real-time updates on pothole repairs and ensure

NASHIK: The Deolali Rotary Club recently conducted a health check-up of approximately 3,000 students across six schools in Deolali Camp and nearby areas. The health evaluation revealed that nearly 30% of the students were below normal health standards.

The health camp was held on Monday, January 6, at the Cantonment Board's Primary School.
