

Third leopard trapped at Pimpalgaon Khamb



NASHIK: A third leopard has been trapped in Pimpalgaon Khamb. The animal was caught around midnight on Monday, September 2, in a cage installed near the filter plant. This trap comes just eight days after two other leopards were trapped in

the same area, following a fatal attack on a child last

claimed the life of fouryear-old Ayush Bhagat of Wadner Dumala on the eve of Raksha Bandhan festival, had sparked outrage among residents. Led

by former corporator Keshav Porje, villagers held a protest march demanding action from the forest department. In response, 15 cages were installed across Wadner Dumala and Pimpalgaon Khamb areas.

Former corporators Keshav Porje and Jagdish Pawar reached the spot after learning about leopard was trapped. Thereafter forest officials were informed about. They then arrived at the spot and after inspecting the cage they moved the leopard to Mhasrul. The incident drew large crowds of villagers, many gathering to catch a glimpse of the trapped animal.

6,000 gelatin sticks, detonators seized



crackdown on illegal explosives, rural police seized over 6,000 gelatin sticks along with thousands of electric detonators during raids in Sarul village of Wadivirhe area. The action comes just two days after city police arrested a scrap dealer and two others for dumping gelatin sticks in the Mumbai Naka area

Based on confidential information received by Additional Superintendent of Police (SP) Aditya Mirkhelkar, a special team was formed to raid unauthorized godowns in Sarul. Acting on this input, inspector Bhagwan Mathure of Wadivirhe police station, assistant inspector Dinkar Munde from the SP's office, sub-inspector Amol Suryavanshi and their colleagues along with the dog squad and bomb detection team, carried out searches in Sarul on Tuesday

(September 2).

During the raids, the police recovered 49 boxes containing 6,125 gelatin sticks, 2,200 electric detonators and 150 metres of D.F. wire, together worth Rs. 95,750. The explosives had been stored dangerously close to houses and sheds without mandatory licenses. The accused have been

identified as Gorakh Bajirao Dhage (34), Vikas Navale, Omkar Kailas Navale (23), and Gaurav Mohan Navale (32), all residents of Sarul, along with Deepak Dashrath Kshirsagar (32), a resident of Shingve Bahula. In addition, Amit Ajmera and Kothavde, both trained handlers of explosives, have also been booked. Police said the trained handlers failed in their duty to ensure safety, despite knowing that keeping gelatin sticks and detonators together could lead to a devastating explosion.

Superintendent of Police Balasaheb Patil has ordered a strict drive against illegal trades and directed officials to strengthen crime prevention across the district.

In Sarul village, gelatin sticks and detonators were kept recklessly inside a metal shed and next to a residential house without any official license. The suspects Amit and Kothavde, who were trained to handle explosives, sold gelatin sticks but failed to follow mandatory procedures such as recording sales or storing unused stock in designated magazines. Police officials stated that if these explosives had accidentally gone off, the entire village would have been destroyed.

The department warned that immersion in these places not only pollutes water but also endangers aquatic life and poses risks to human safety.

To safeguard reservoirs and ensure pollution-free dam areas, the department has advised local bodies and gram panchayats to create temporary artificial ponds for idol immersion. It has also asked that separate Nirmalya Kalash be arranged for flowers and other of-

The department emphasized that cooperation from citizens is essential to maintain clean water sources and to prevent environmental damage during the immer-
